
- El Morro The oldest Spanish fort in the New World and a protected UNESCO World Heritage Site. ��

- 6 Casa del Libro A restored 18th-century townhouse that now houses a museum containing over 5,000 manuscripts.


- Museo de Arte A state-of-the-art show-case for the island's rich cultural heritage.
- 8 The Teatro Tapia Built in 1832, this is one of the oldest theaters in the Western Hemisphere.

- San Jose Church Located in Old San Juan, this church is one of the earliest surviving examples of 16th-century Gothic architecture. ❖
- La Puerto de San Juan The only remaining entrance to the old city. ��
- ② Casa Blanca This mansion, built in 1521, was home to Ponce de León and has been converted to a National Historic Museum. ❖

Founded in 1521 by Ponce de León, San Juan is the oldest city in U.S. territory. Surrounding the entrance to San Juan harbor sits the "Old City," the historic core of this multifaceted city. Considered the Gibraltar of the West Indies, this area was once a walled city surrounded by multiple forts to protect access to the Spanish Main. As a military foothold the city endured many attacks by the Dutch and British, some of which proved partially successful. In fact, in 1596 the British took over Puerto Rico for 65 days. The population of San Juan continued to grow within the city walls until the late 19th century, when the island of Puerto Rica was ceded to the U.S. at the conclusion of the Spanish-American War. Despite every effort to the contrary, many of these fortifications remain intact, giving the impression of traveling back in time as you explore its many plazas, churches and gardens. Moreover, Puerto Rico may be a part of the U.S., but its music, culture and cuisine are a unique fusion of indigenous Taino culture with European and African influences. Modern-day San Juan encompasses a vast metropolis complete with several unique neighborhoods, which allows access to Spanish fiestas, African music and architecture reminiscent of Buenos Aires or Seville, all within one city.
