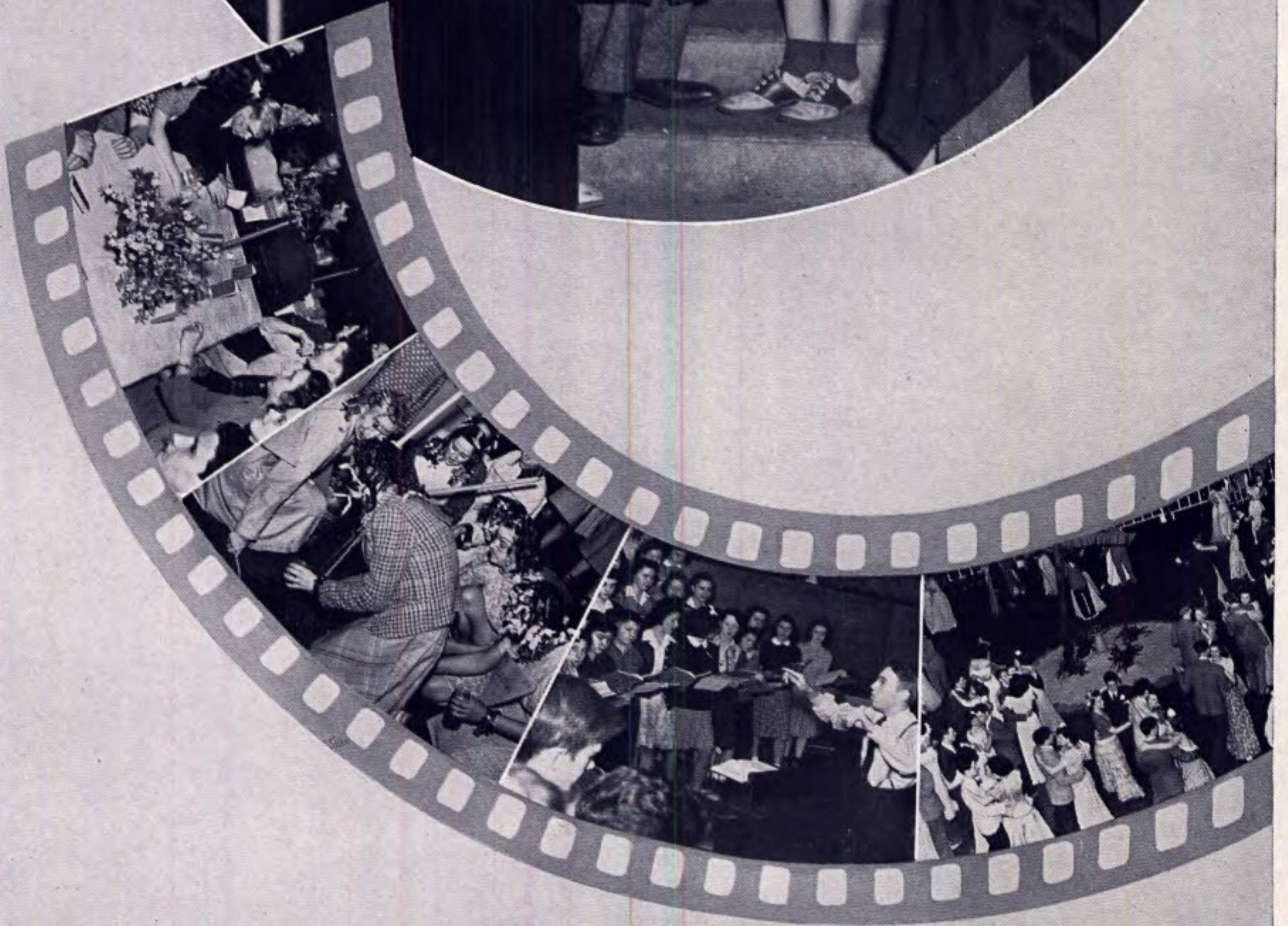
MEMORIES of . . .

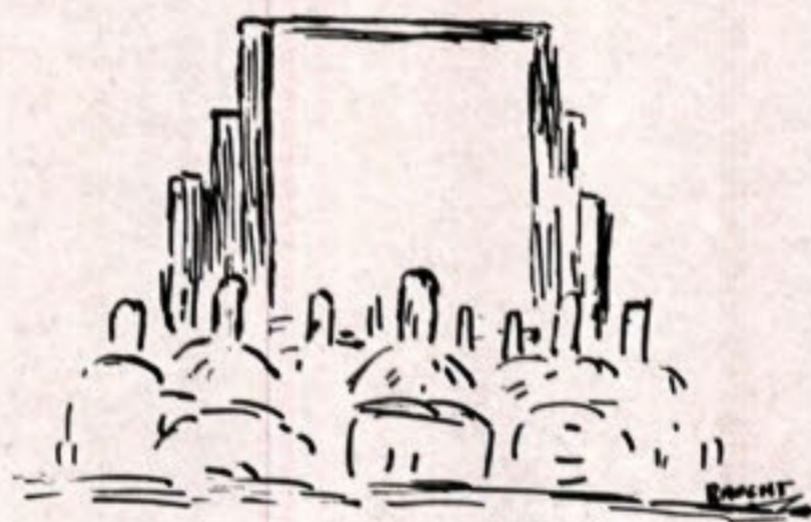




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FEATURE PRESENTATION

SUPERINTENDENT E. T. CHAPMAN

An enviable asset, not only to the school but to the community as a whole, Dr. E. T. Chapman has proved to be a tactful and versatile superintendent throughout the years. He is a part-time occupant of his Ken-Hi office, being a popular consultant of all the schools in the New Kensington system.

Born and reared in Pennsylvania, he is a graduate of Ashland College, Ashland, Ohio, the University of Pittsburgh, and the recipient of a Doc-

tor of Pedagogy degree at Westminster College, conferred upon him last summer. In addition to his regular duties, Dr. Chapman addresses the student body in assemblies when the occasion demands, and meets with the members of the Board of Activities at their meetings. He began his work in this city as principal of one of the grade schools but through tireless effort has now become one of the leading educators in Western Pennsylvania.

PRINCIPALS

Too many of us associate Mr. Weaver with pink slips and detention hall, but he plays a much more important role in our school life. It is due to his efforts that our complex high school organization runs so smoothly. His educational background—graduate of Bucknell University, and graduate work at the University of Pittsburgh and the University of Chicago—has helped in his understanding of our school's problems. ed our faculty-student plan of managing extra-curricular activities by means of a Board of Activities, originated our present system of checking attendance, helped our chapter of the National Honor Society get its start and sponsors our school's College Club. Mr. Weaver has contributed much to the advancement of Ken Hi and it is to him we owe a vote of thanks for taking such a keen interest in our welfare.

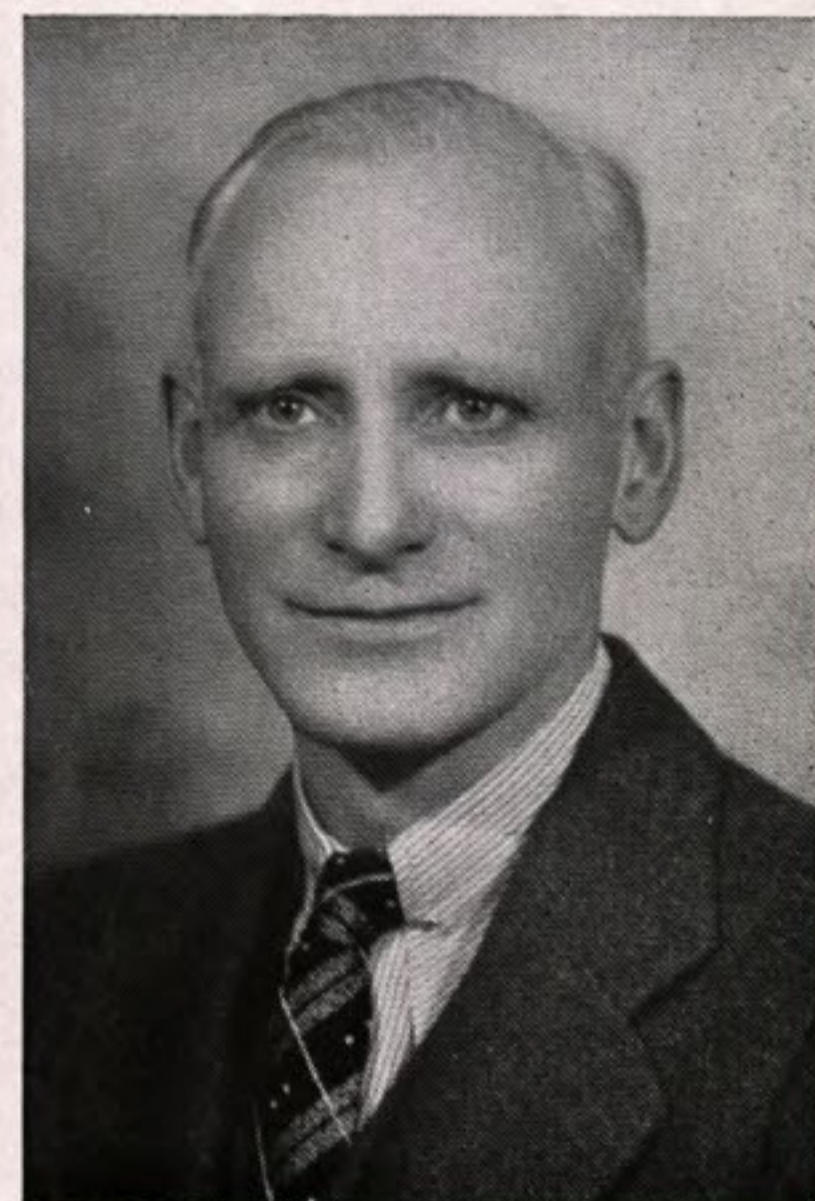
Mr. Johnson is principal of the New Kensington Junior High School and supervises all the work in seventh, eighth and ninth grades.

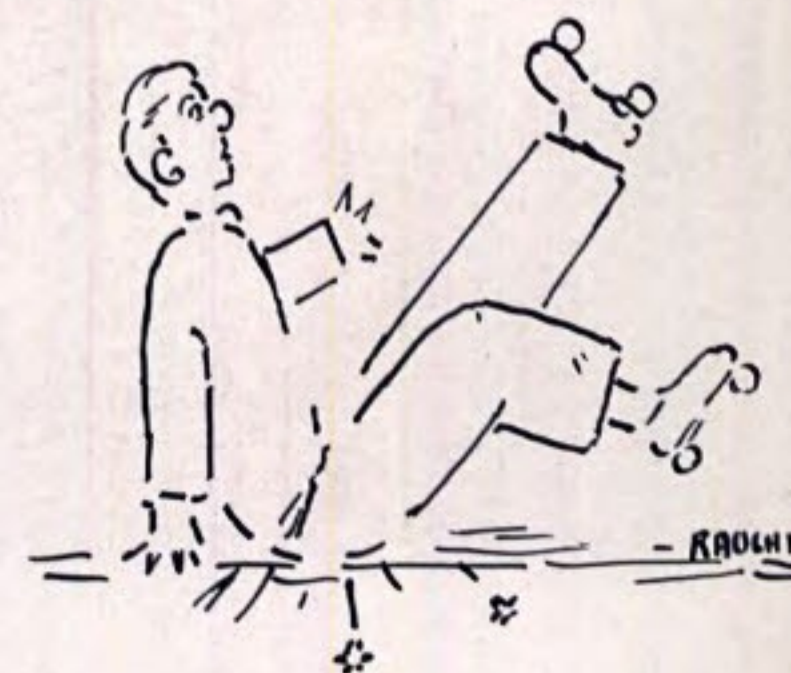

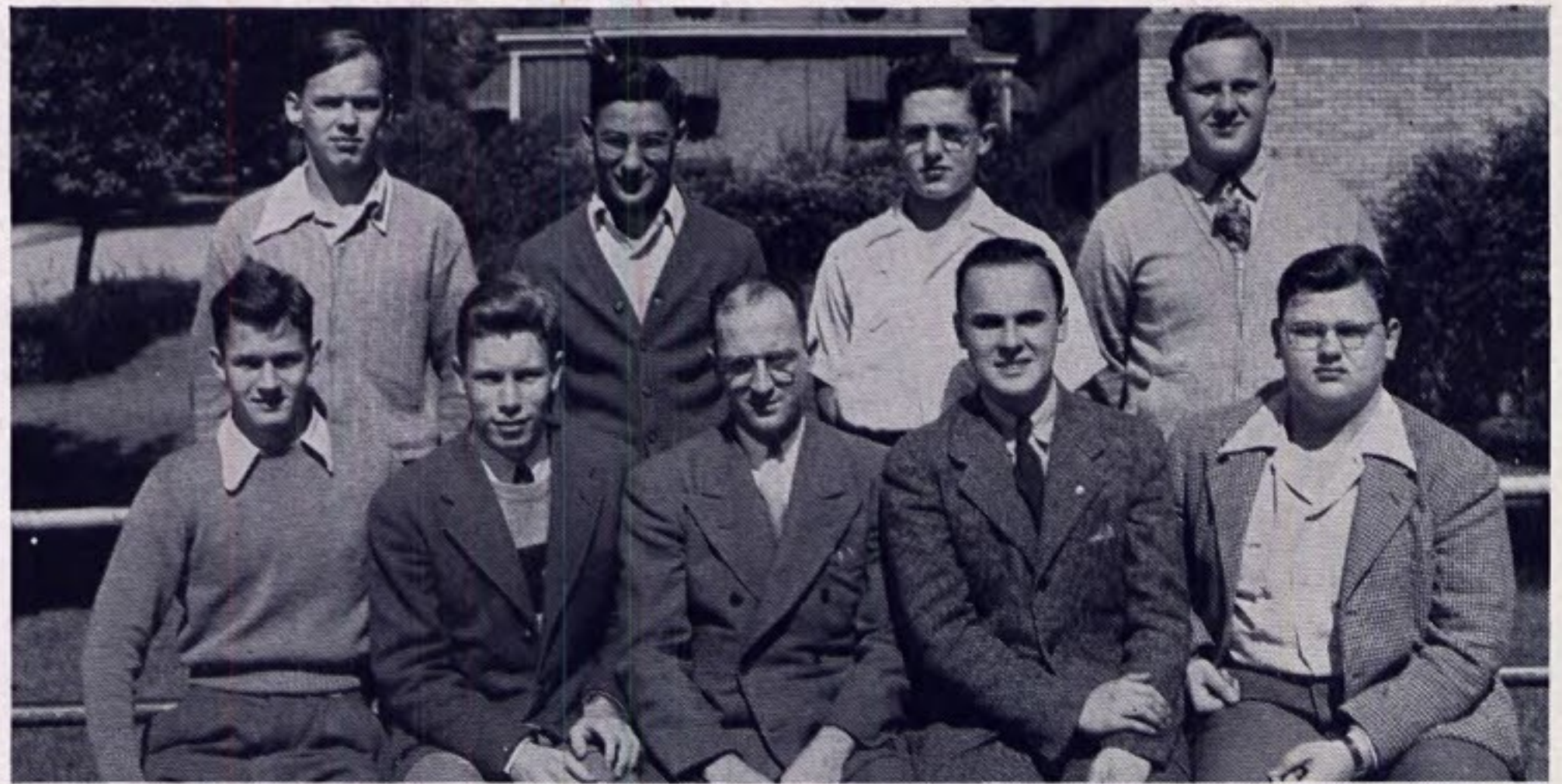
MONITORS

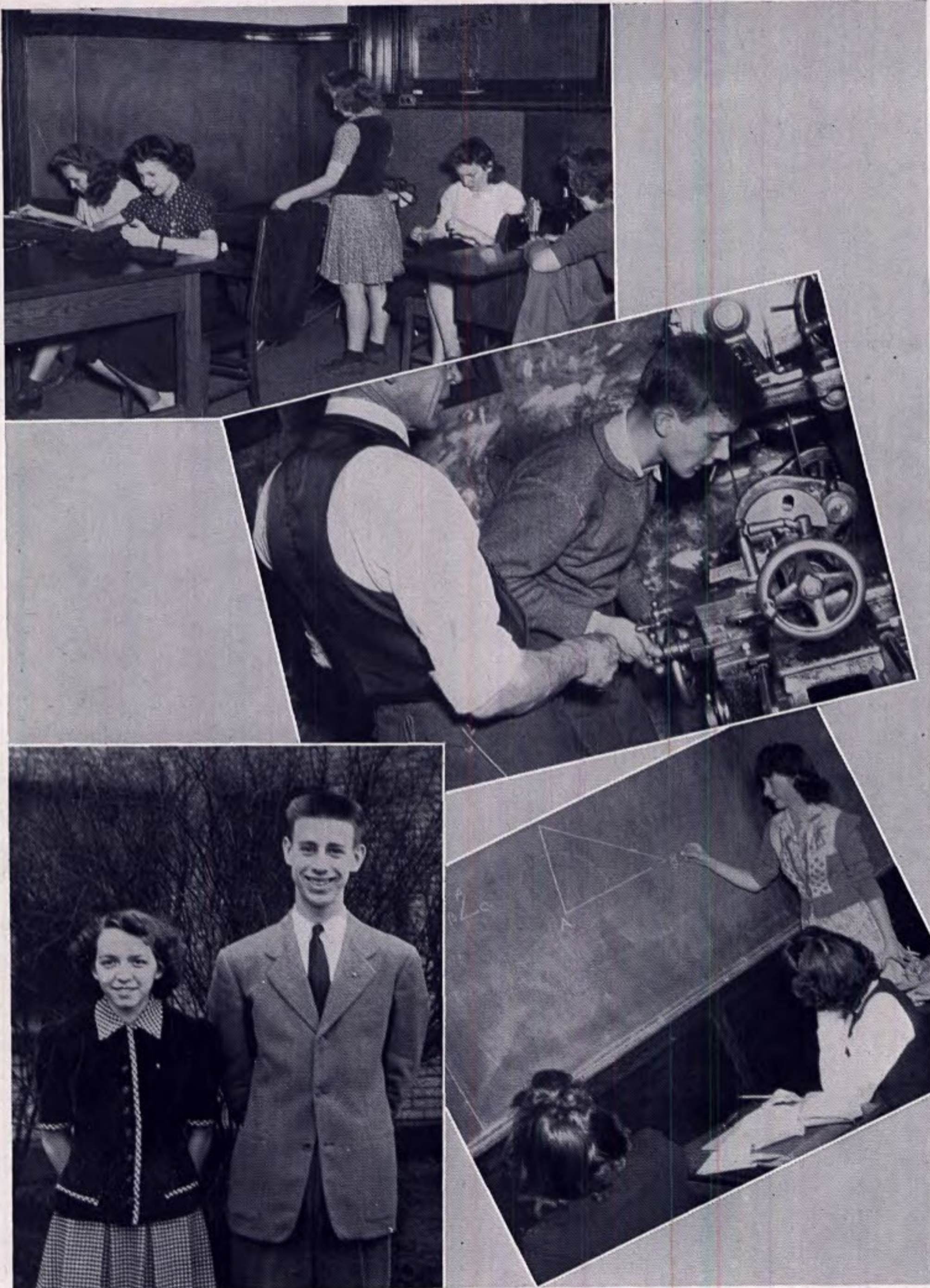

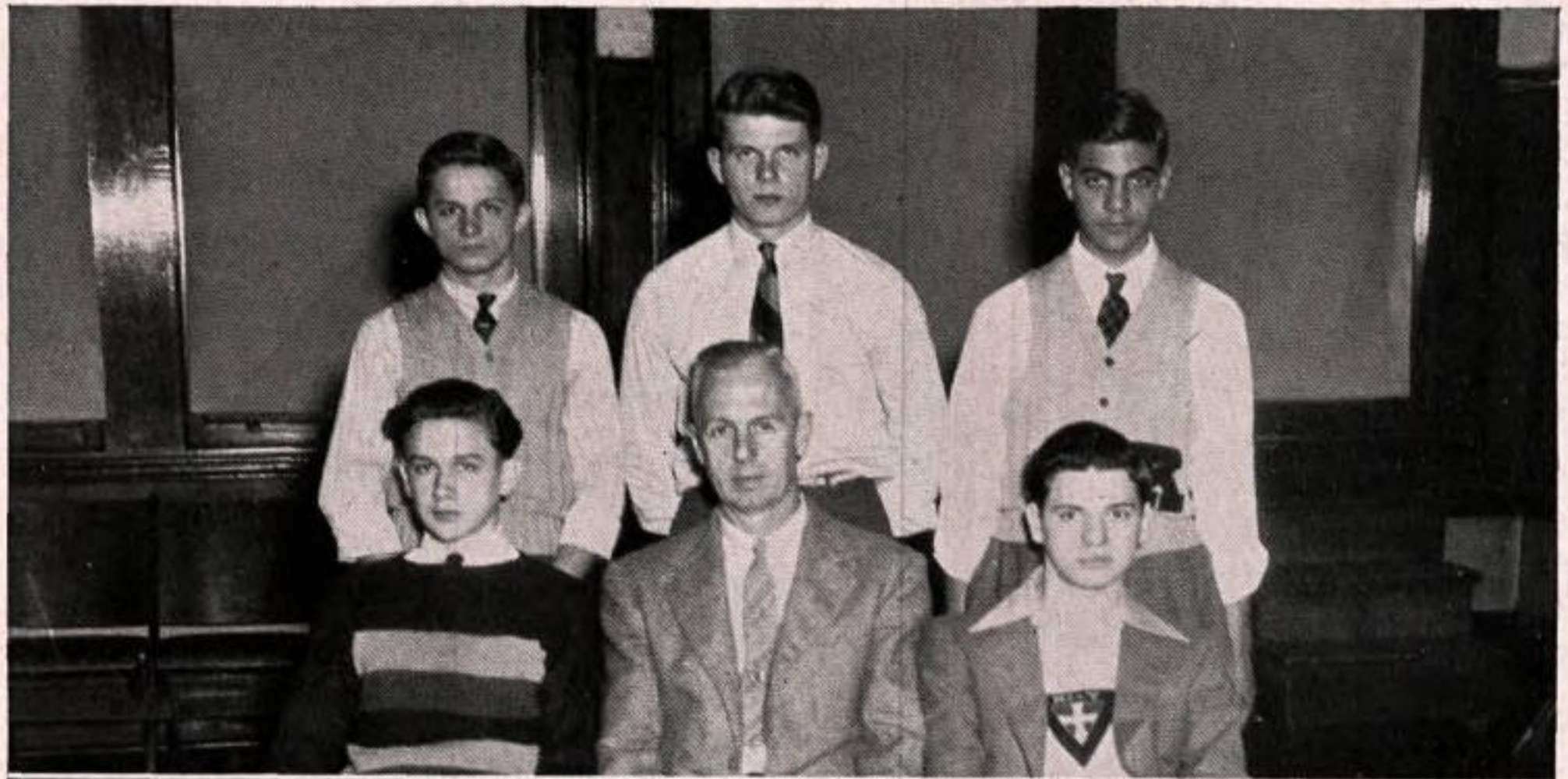
VOCATIONAL HI-Y

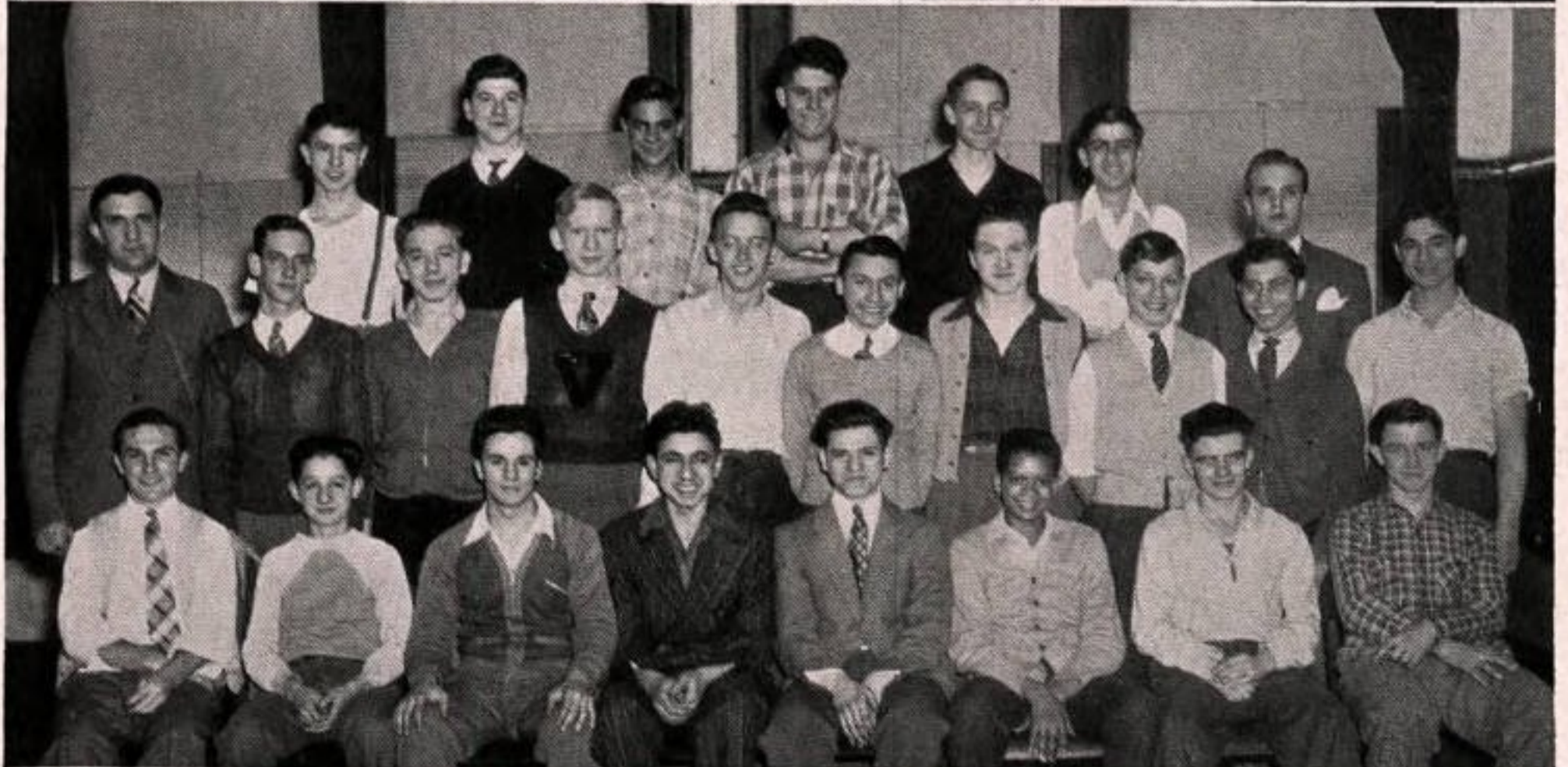

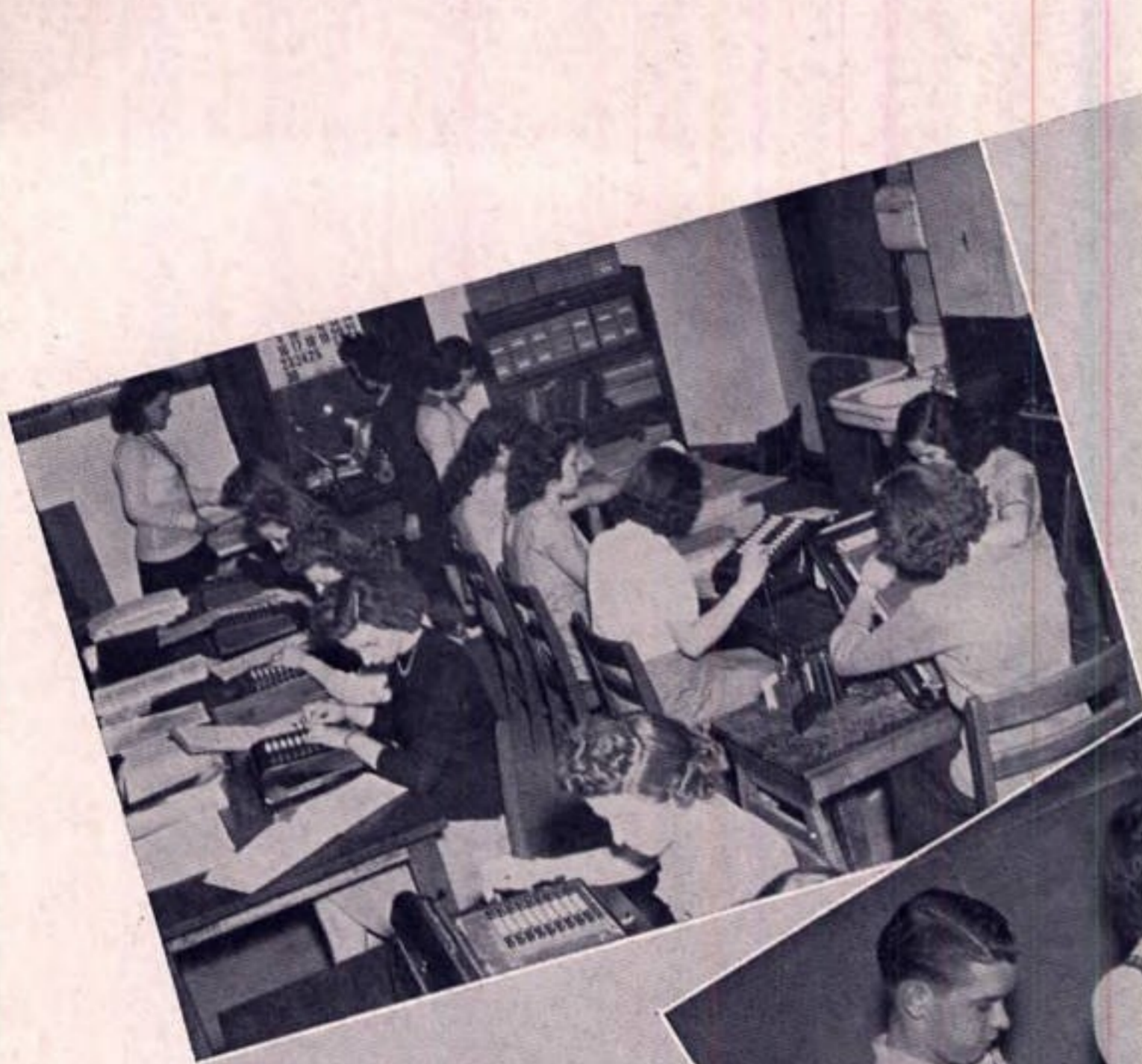

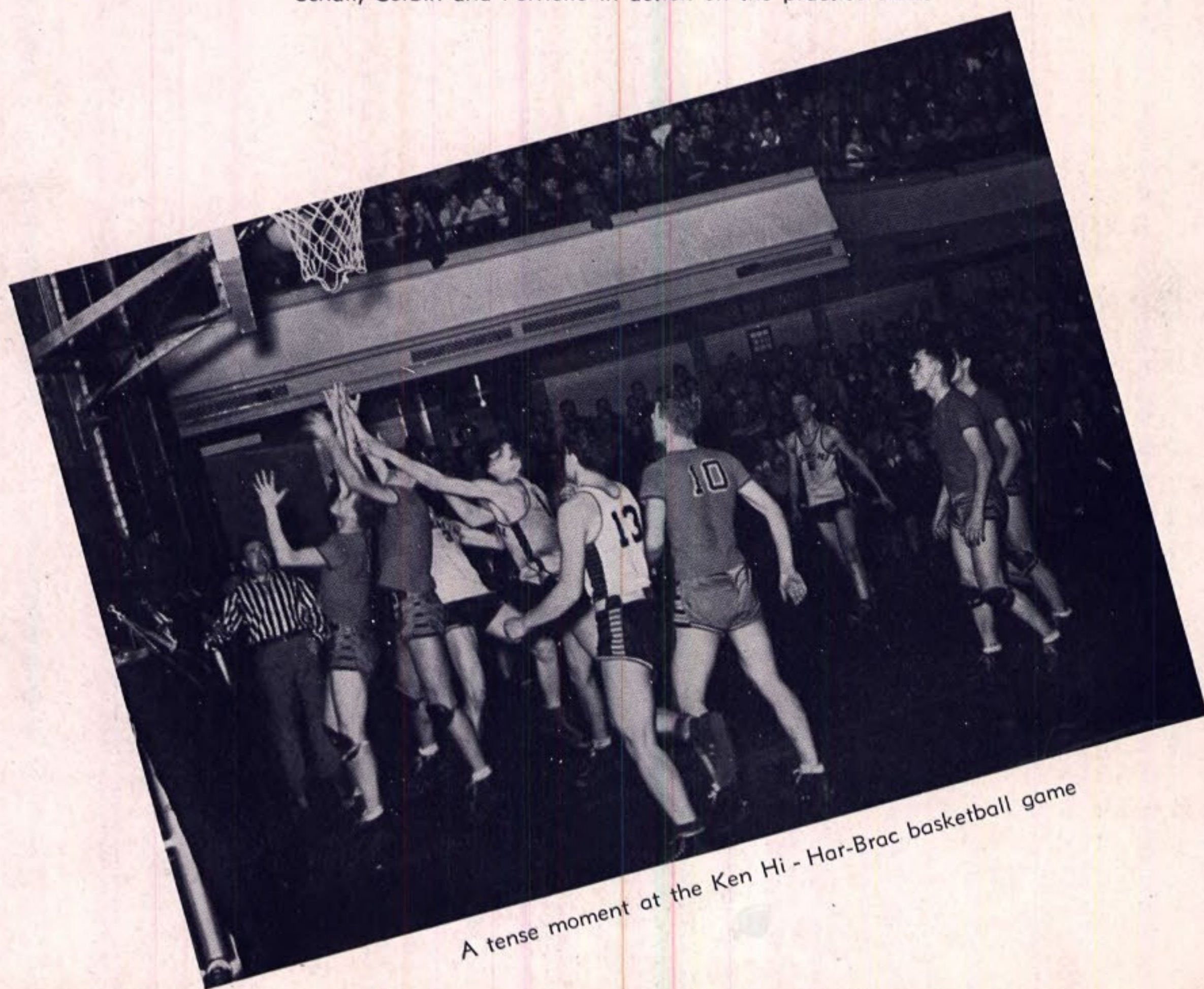

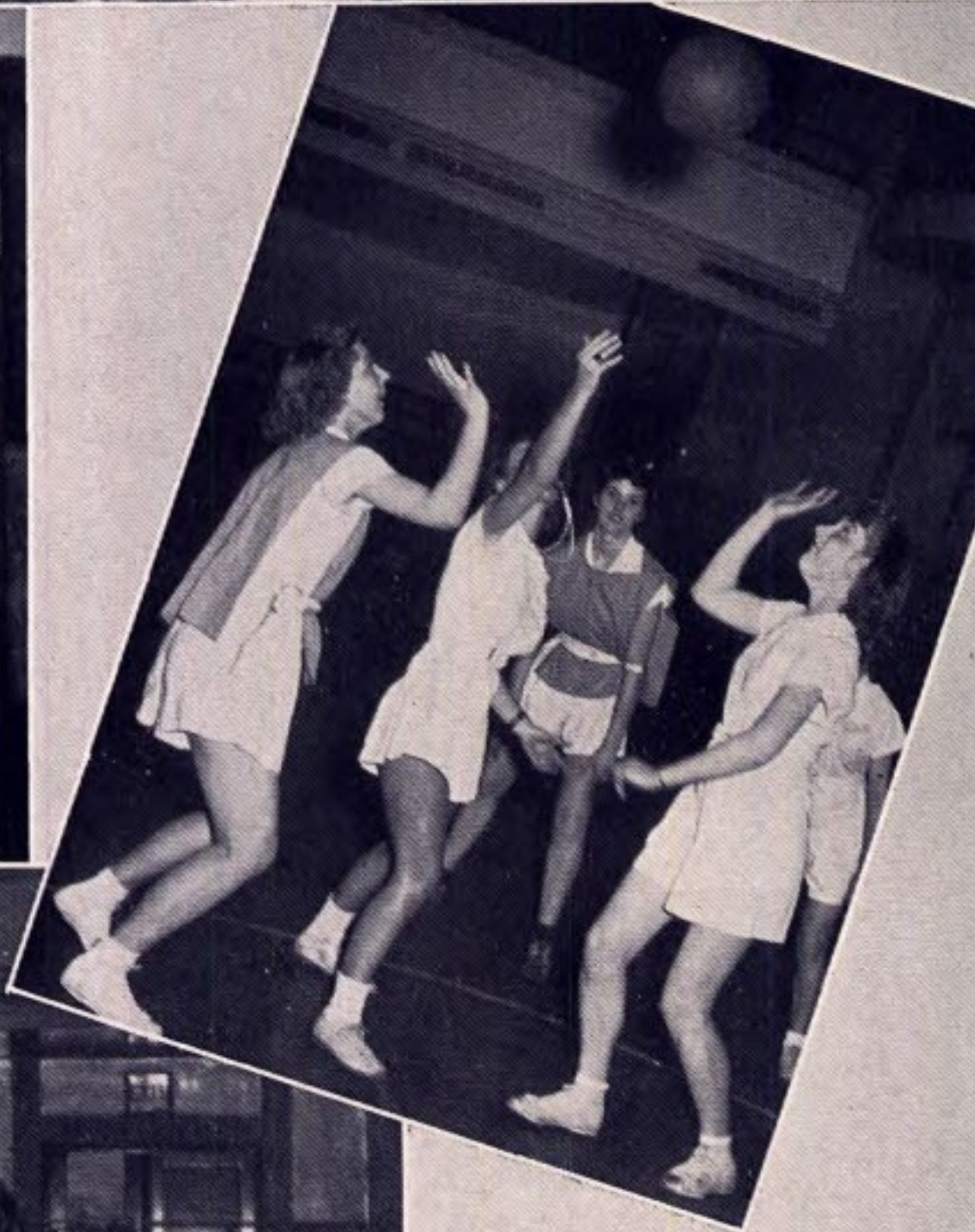

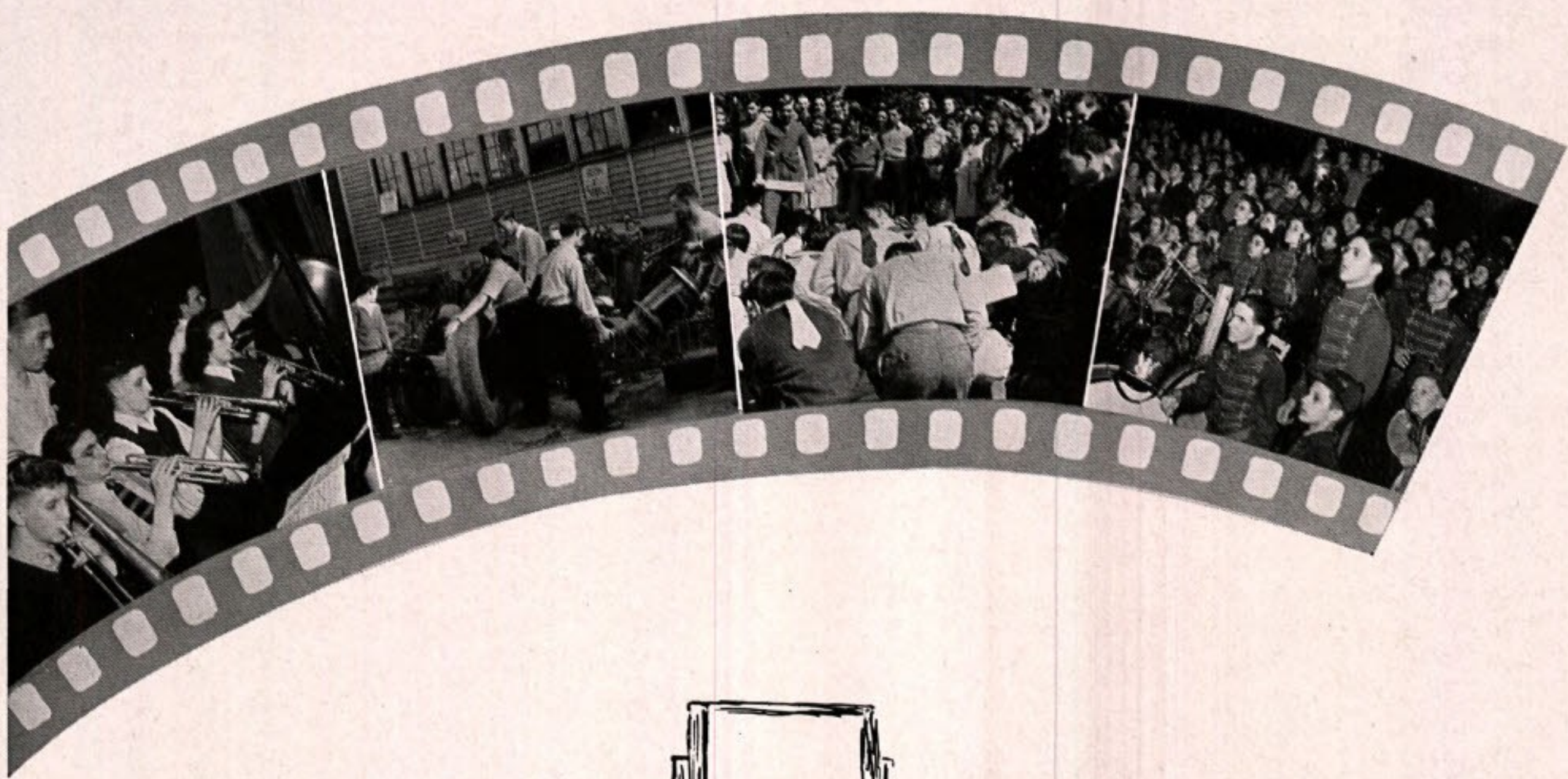

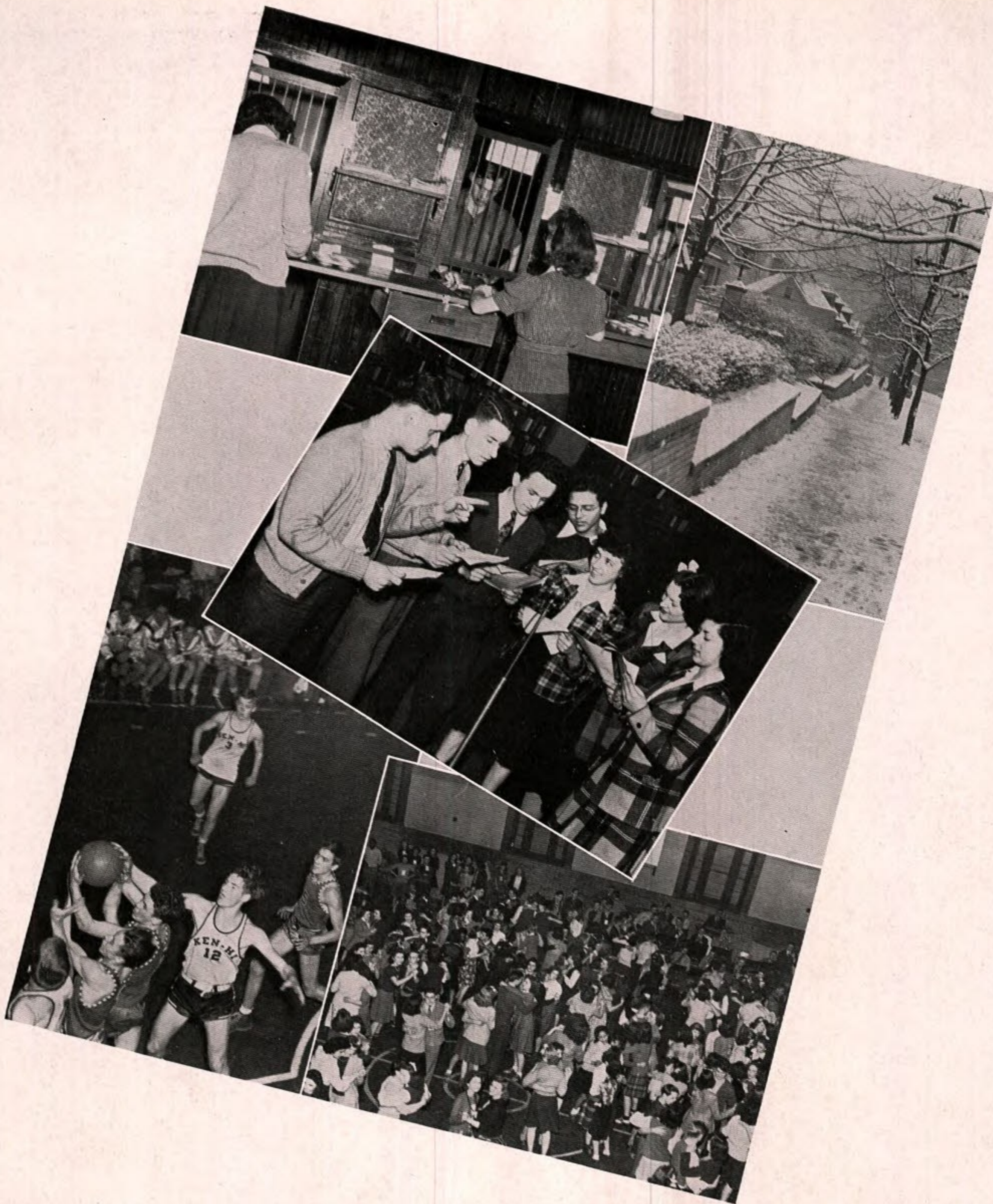

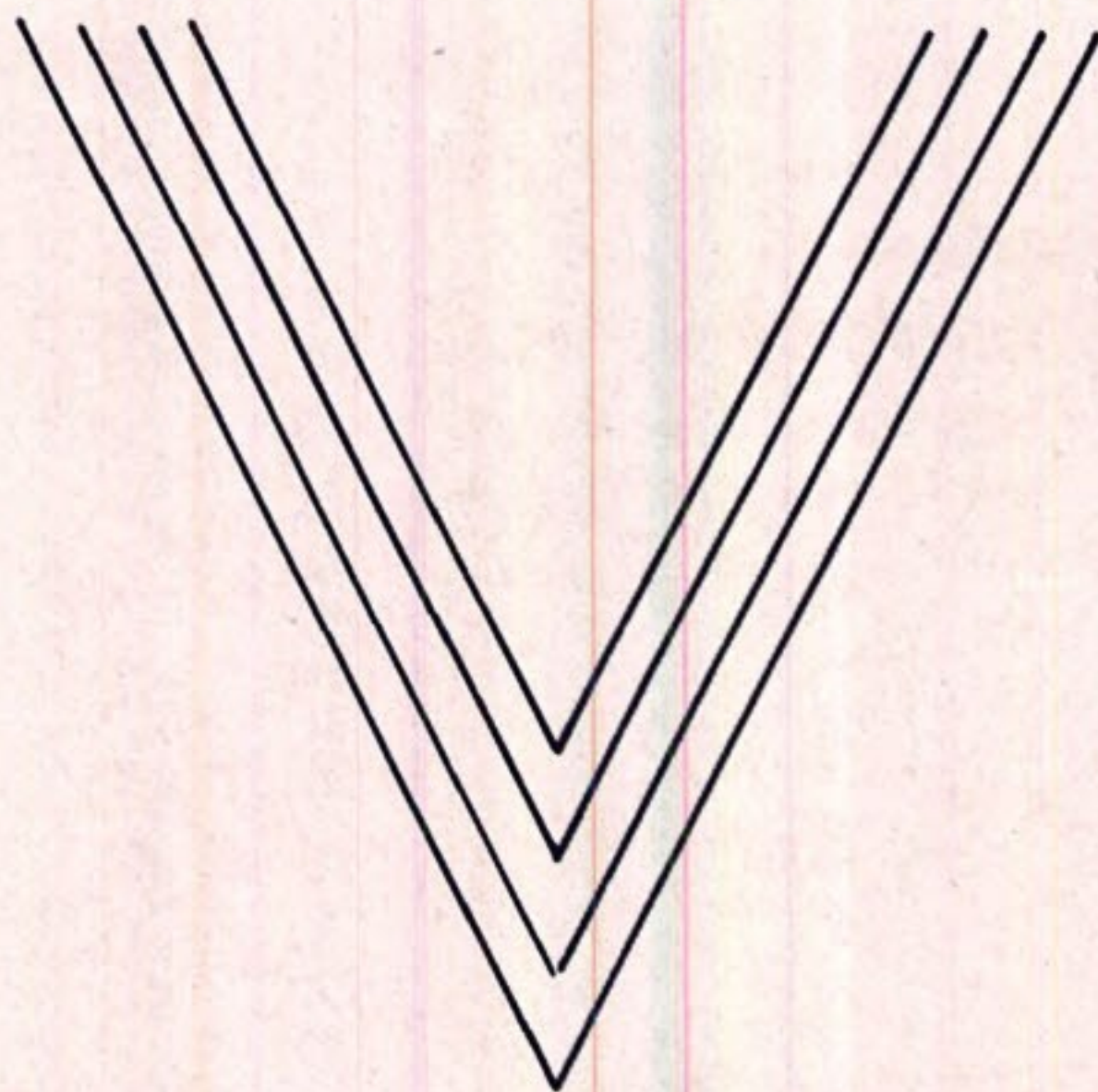

"If you are content with the present situation and with the present results in industry, in agriculture, and in our civilian life," said Secretary of War Stimson, "then I suggest that you go to one of our great army camps and see our boys in uniform working. I suggest that you read the detailed dispatches from Tunisia and the Southwest Pacific about the fighting efforts of our soldiers. I suggest that you compare your comforts in life with theirs, and then ask yourself again—Are you content?"

No, we are not content, and we will not be content until victory is ours. We will not be content until dictatorships have been done away with and the four freedoms are enjoyed by all peoples.

Every member of the faculty and student body and every person connected with the school has been and is doing his little part to bring that day of victory closer. We all realize the importance of service to our country and that is why nine members of our faculty are now in uniform and in the service of the United States. The men are not the only ones in service; two women, a former teacher and a former secretary, are now enlisted in the WAVES. These members of the faculty and former employee of the school felt that they could do more to bring victory by enlisting in their respective services than by working on the home front.

To realize the extent to which the alumni of our school have been drawn into the armed services, one has only to recall the daily sketches of local boys printed in our newspaper.

It is impossible to calculate percentages, but the alumni of Ken Hi have answered the call to colors in large numbers for all branches of serv-

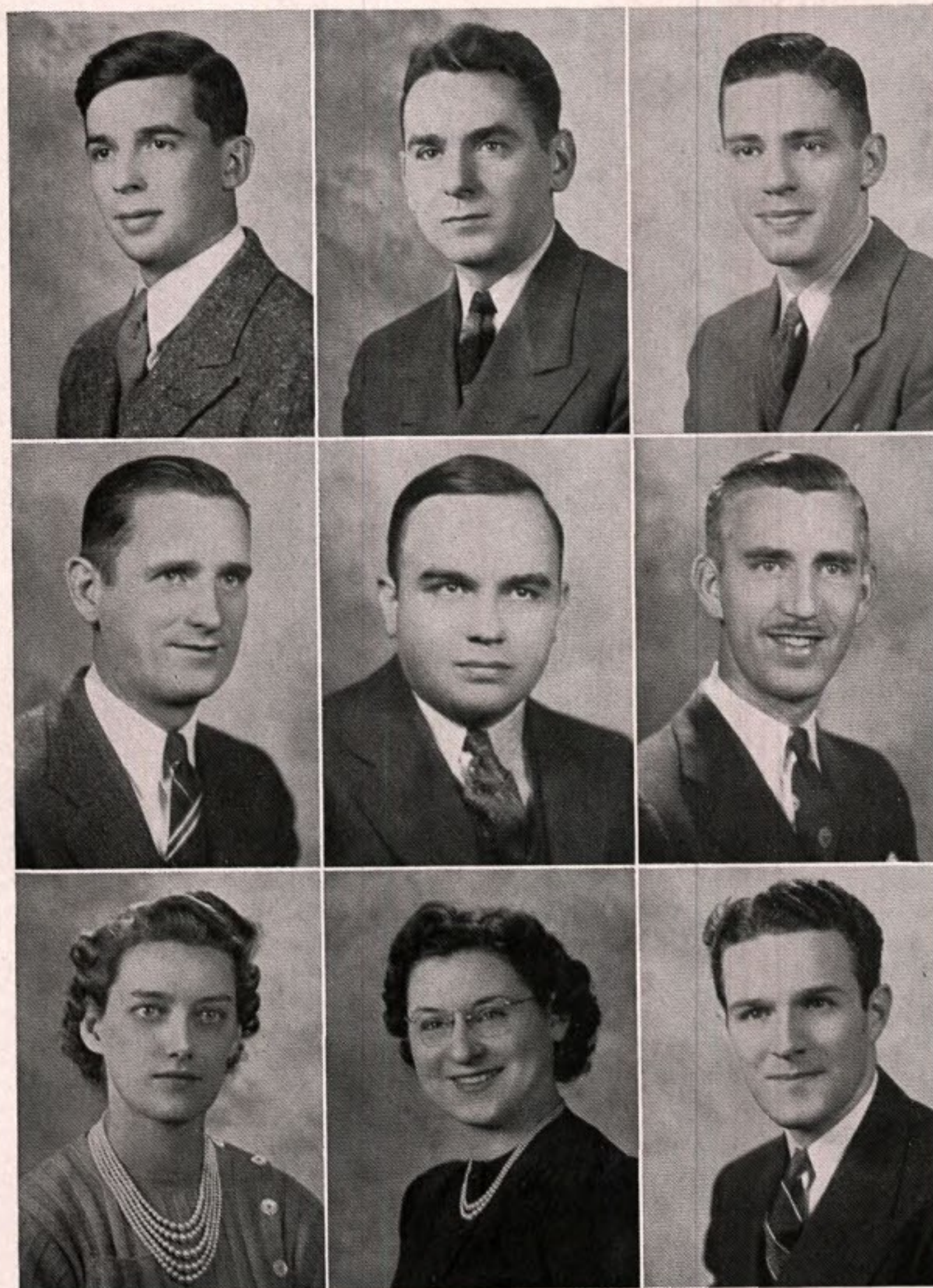
ice. Faculty and students pay tribute to these former Ken Hi students who have given their lives for their country and to those who are now serving it.

The students are not to be outdone by their former teachers and the alumni. Many of them have been called by the draft and those who are not of age have been enlisting in the reserve corps, subject to call. Then, too, quite a number of fellow seniors have already taken positions in the war industries in order to release the manpower which is needed in winning this war.

The Victory Club, composed of the entire student body, deserves great credit for its contribution toward the war effort. This club has complete charge of the sale of War Savings Stamps and Bonds to the students and faculty members. Weekly contests conducted among the classes have stimulated the sales of bonds and stamps to an extent that results are considered excellent. In conjunction with sale of bonds and stamps the Victory Club has conducted the campaigns for the collection of books, magazines, and records to be sent to our boys in the United States army camps. This good work of the club will be continued for the duration of the war. The Ken Hi U. S. O. club was organized to aid the city U. S. O. group in its efforts to cheer our soldiers, sailors, and marines, and to make them feel that New Kensington is proud that they are serving their country. The U. S. O. has held several dances, the proceeds of which were handed over to the senior organization.

Faculty, alumni, and students of New Kensington High School will continue to serve their country until such time as they can say, "Now that the job is done, we are content."
