OUR LOYALTY





TRUE CATHOLIC living continues as the core of the curriculum through study of the third of the *Quest for Happiness* series, attendance at weekly Mass and Fr. Eckle's instructions, and through deepening personal convictions.

In secular subjects, the program becomes diverse. Juniors may choose the Latin-Science, Modern Classical, or Academic Commercial course. If the CH-er is college bound, or desires to enter nurses' training school, she will probably choose the Latin-Science course with English, Latin, chemistry, and French as majors. Latin III is concerned with Cicero's orations, but actually much more is learned. Juniors grasp the fundamentals of chemistry, and perform a great many experiments in their well-equipped laboratory. French I centers largely on pronunciation, reading, and grammar.


The Modern Classical course follows the same schedule as the Latin-Science, except that French replaces Latin, and Problems in Democracy can be introduced.






