


This radio program must have been a good one to keep serious faces on these boys.









Board of Education




JUNIOR CLASS



SOPHOMORE CLASS







ACTIVITIES





Mr. Jefferson is Ken's Hi's Equipment Manager. All the finely outfitted Ken Hi teams bear witness to the excellent job he does.


