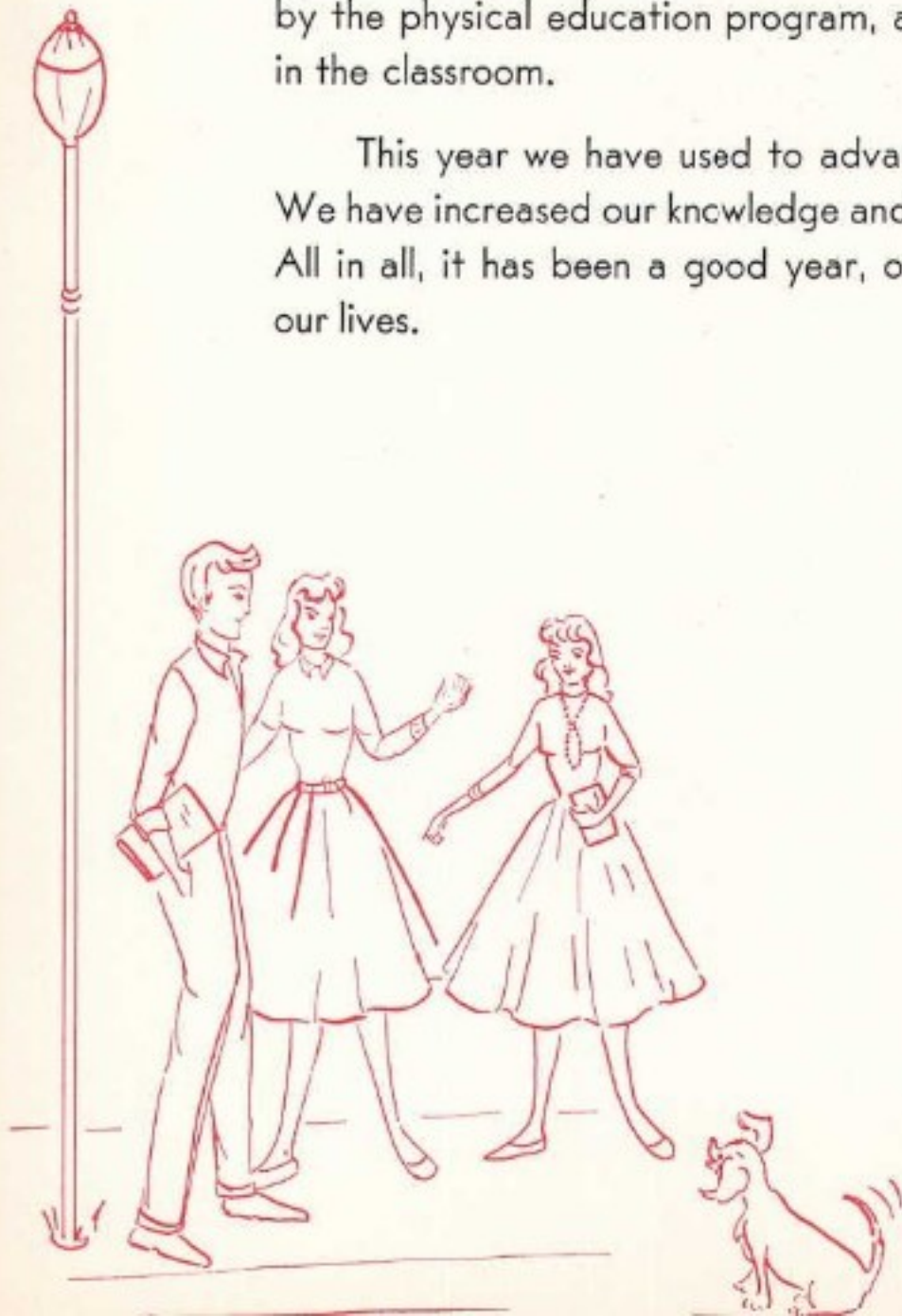
foreword

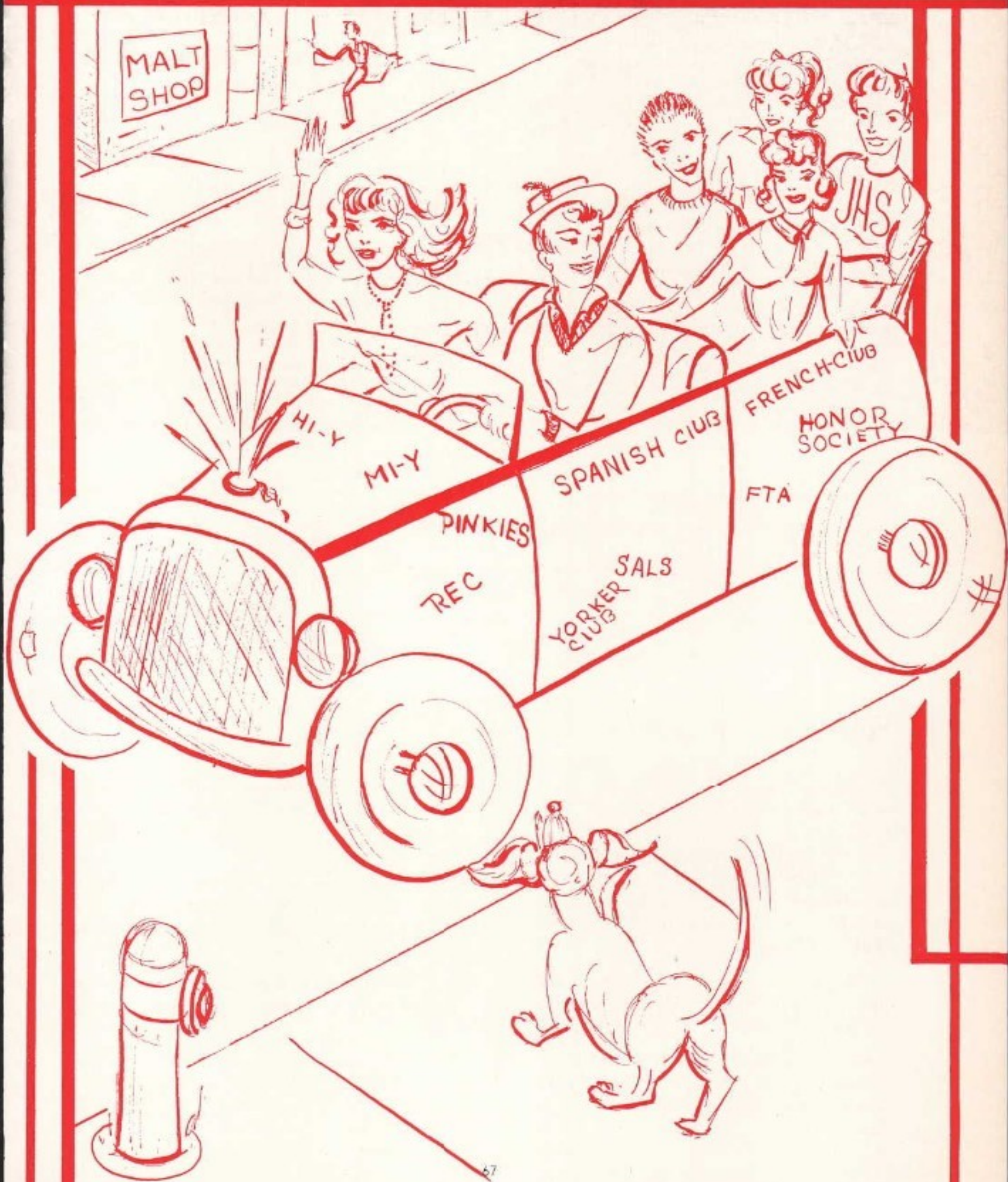
The members of Kappa Alpha Tau Chapter nominated Luther Burbank for the Hall of Fame at New York University. This is usually done every five years.

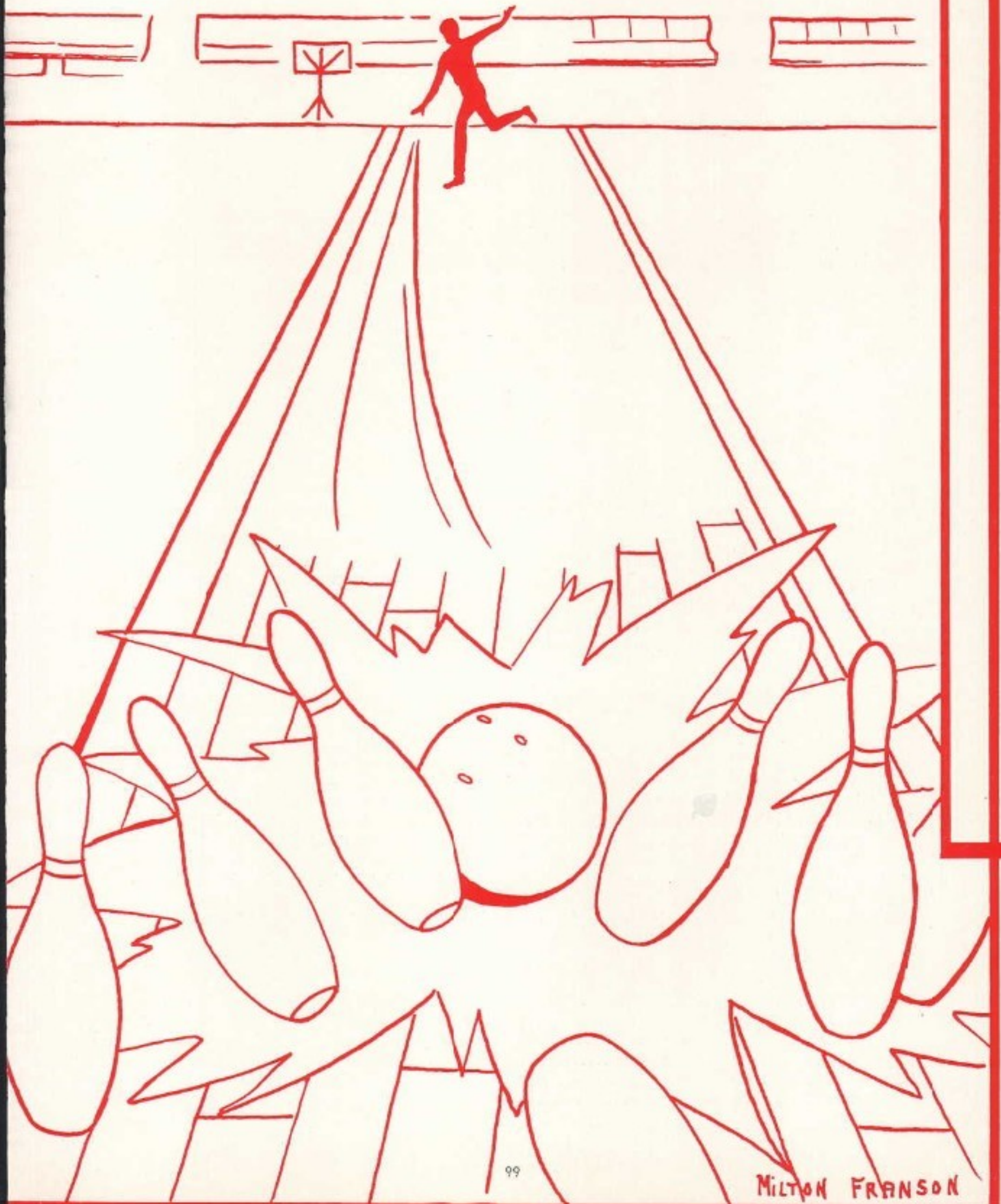

Coaches who were of great assistance to Mr. Colburn were Coach Allan F. Ayers on the line, and Coach Harold Rubens, who trained the sophomores.

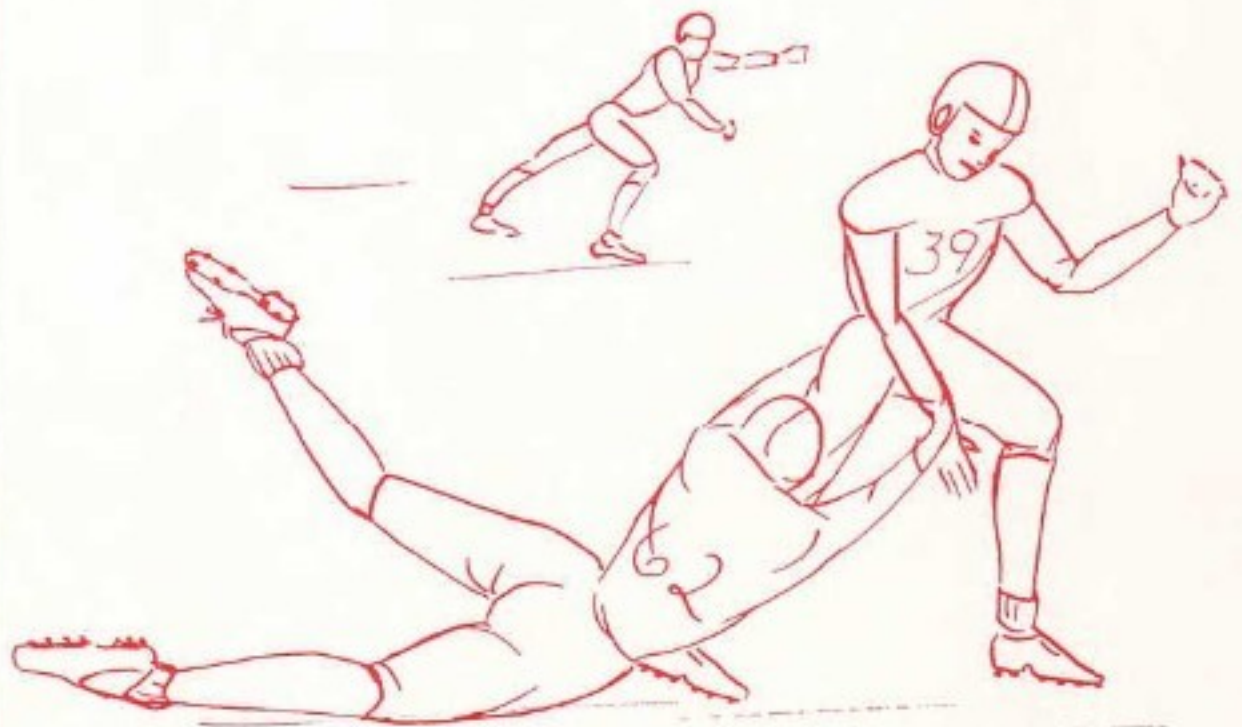

SWIMMING
