The campaign drive, which was very successful as usual, was held from February 20th to March 5th. Because of the demand, the sale was continued for two additional days.

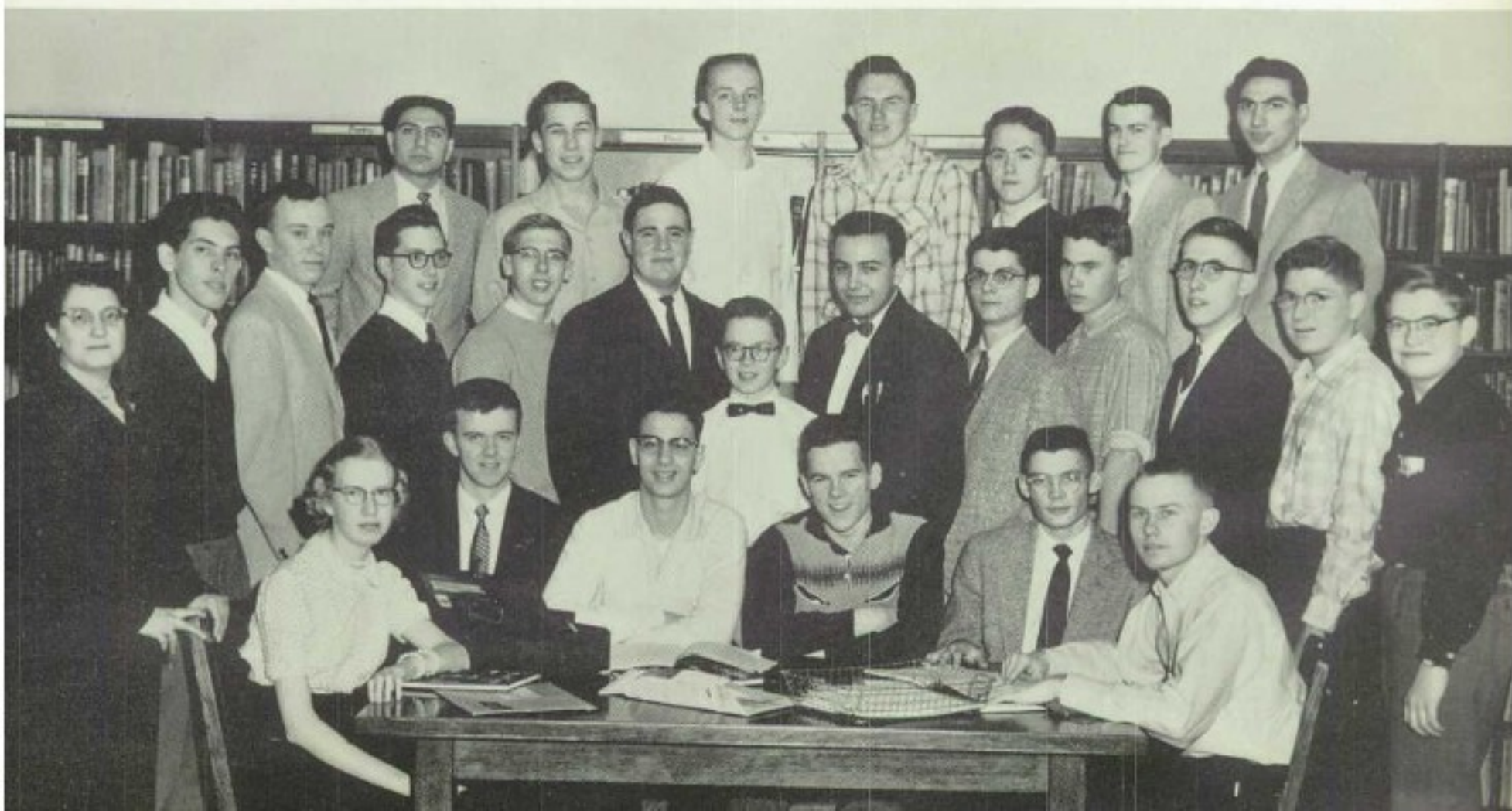

J-QUILL

When is the deadline? Have you had the pictures taken for your page? When will the pictures come back from the engravers? Have you any good ideas for headlines? These questions and many others are asked every time J-Quill plans an issue. A great deal of time is required by the page editors, typists, proof-readers, editor-in-chief, and advisor, for each issue. All the copy must be typed, proof-read, and taken to the printer. The pages must be planned by the editors and headlines must be written. Ann Hedberg, editor-in-chief, had charge of the entire paper this year. Additional guidance was obtained from Miss F. Elizabeth Jacques, faculty advisor of J-Quill. Roto, a monthly publication sent by the University of Minnesota to high schools throughout the country free of charge, was distributed in addition to the issues of J-Quill.

J-Quill has charge of writing "Along JHS Corridors," a weekly column which appears in the Jamestown Post-Journal. Reporters from J-Quill gather the school news and compile it into a single column. This year Susan Brown was the editor.

In February in order to raise some money to meet the increased cost of printing, J-Quill sponsored a dance after the Jamestown-Dunkirk basketball game. The special attraction of the dance was the crowning of Denny Gregor and June Ingleson, chosen by the JHS student body as the Valentine King and Queen. Jean Morse served as chairman for this affair.

A ballot appeared in one of the issues for the most valuable football player at J.H.S. this year. The student body chose James DeSantis for this honor and awarded him a certificate of recognition.

Delegates from J-Quill and Red and Green attended the annual High School Press Day Conference at St. Bonaventure in Olean on May 10. The members attended sessions dealing with different fields of journalism and an assembly program, at which awards were presented for outstanding journalism work. A luncheon was served and a reception was held at the golf course.

The school paper was entered in national competition at Columbia University again this year. It was judged on a national basis at the 32nd Annual Convention of the Scholastic Press Association held March 15-17 in New York City.

QUILL AND SCROLL

Quill and Scroll, the international honor society for high school journalists, has more than thirty-five hundred chapters. These are located in nearly every state in the Union, and in Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Canada and Australia. Organized on April 10, 1926, by a group of high school supervisors for the purpose of encouraging and rewarding individual achievement in journalism and allied fields, the society has taken an active part in raising standards in this field and in directing the course of high school journalism. The Jamestown chapter was organized in June of 1954.

Through the official publication of the society, practical information concerning every phase of publication work is presented to editors, staffs, and advisors. Some of the other tasks undertaken by the society are the organization of state press associations, criticism of manuscripts and of publications, establishment of better relations between school and community by means of judicious publicity, improvement of conditions for supervisors and teachers of journalism, and the acquainting of school officials and the public with the value of high school journalism.

When a charter is granted, the advisor automatically becomes a member of Quill and Scroll. Qualifications for student membership in this organization are: (1) Candidates must be of at

least junior standing. (2) They must be in the upper third of their class in general scholastic standing at the time of their election. (3) They must have done superior work in some phase of journalistic or creative endeavor. (4) They must be recommended by the advisor or by the committee governing publications. (5) They must be approved by the Executive Secretary of the national group with headquarters in Chicago. In addition to these qualifications, J-Quill also requires a candidate to have a minimum of seventy-five inches of published material.

A candle lighting induction ceremony was held at the joint staff banquet of J-Quill and Red and Green in the spring of 1956. Members of J-Quill who were inducted include: Susan Brown, Janet Christianson, Gordon Elmeer, Eleanor Goller, Gareth Griffiths, Connie Hickok, Myrna Johnson, Kay Lindahl, and Jean Morse.

The following members of the Red and Green were inducted: Molly Ann Kidder, editor of the yearbook; Lillian Vitanza, associate editor; Richard Fadale, business manager; Russell Batt; and William Hughes.

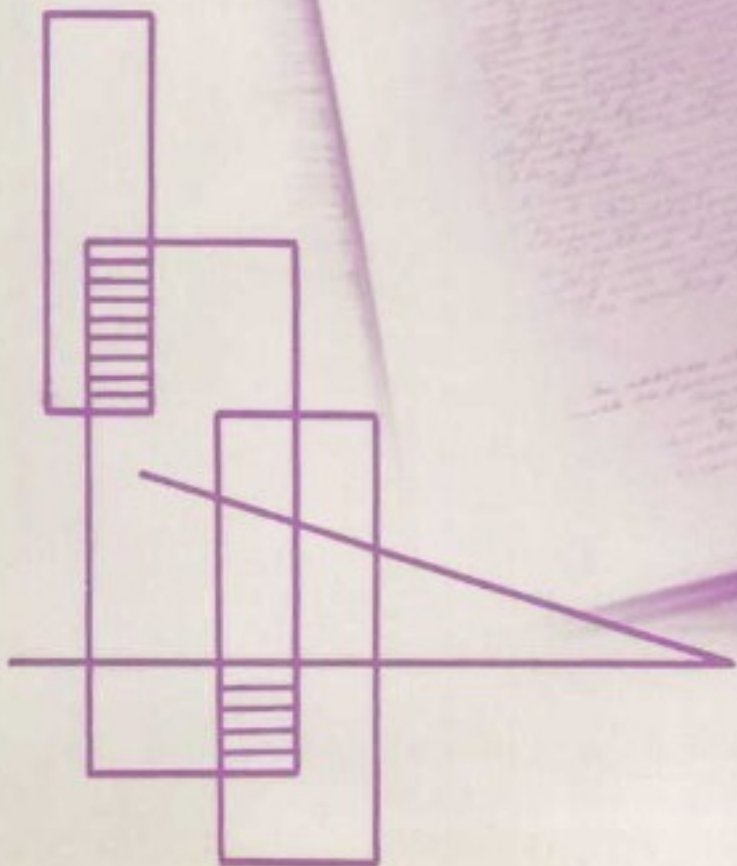

FUTURE NURSES

The 1955-56 year marks the second year in the existence of the Future Nurses Club in Jamstown High School. The plan for the club grew out of an organization started in Michigan in 1938 to stimulate vocational interest. Since that time, the idea had grown rapidly until there are now several thousand such exploratory groups throughout the nation. Our local club, as well as other county clubs, was sparked by the Chautauqua County Medical Auxiliary.

The main purpose of this organization is to explore the field of nursing. One does not necessarily need to become a nurse because of membership in the Future Nurses Club. It simply encourages girls to find out what the field of nursing requires, and what it offers, as well as to help in the decision of whether or not girls should choose this profession.

Having survived the usual troubles of a new organization, the Future Nurses Club has completed its second year. The programs of both

years commenced with rallies held at one of the local hospitals for girls from this area interested in nursing. This year, members of Future Nurses acted as hostesses for this year's rally. 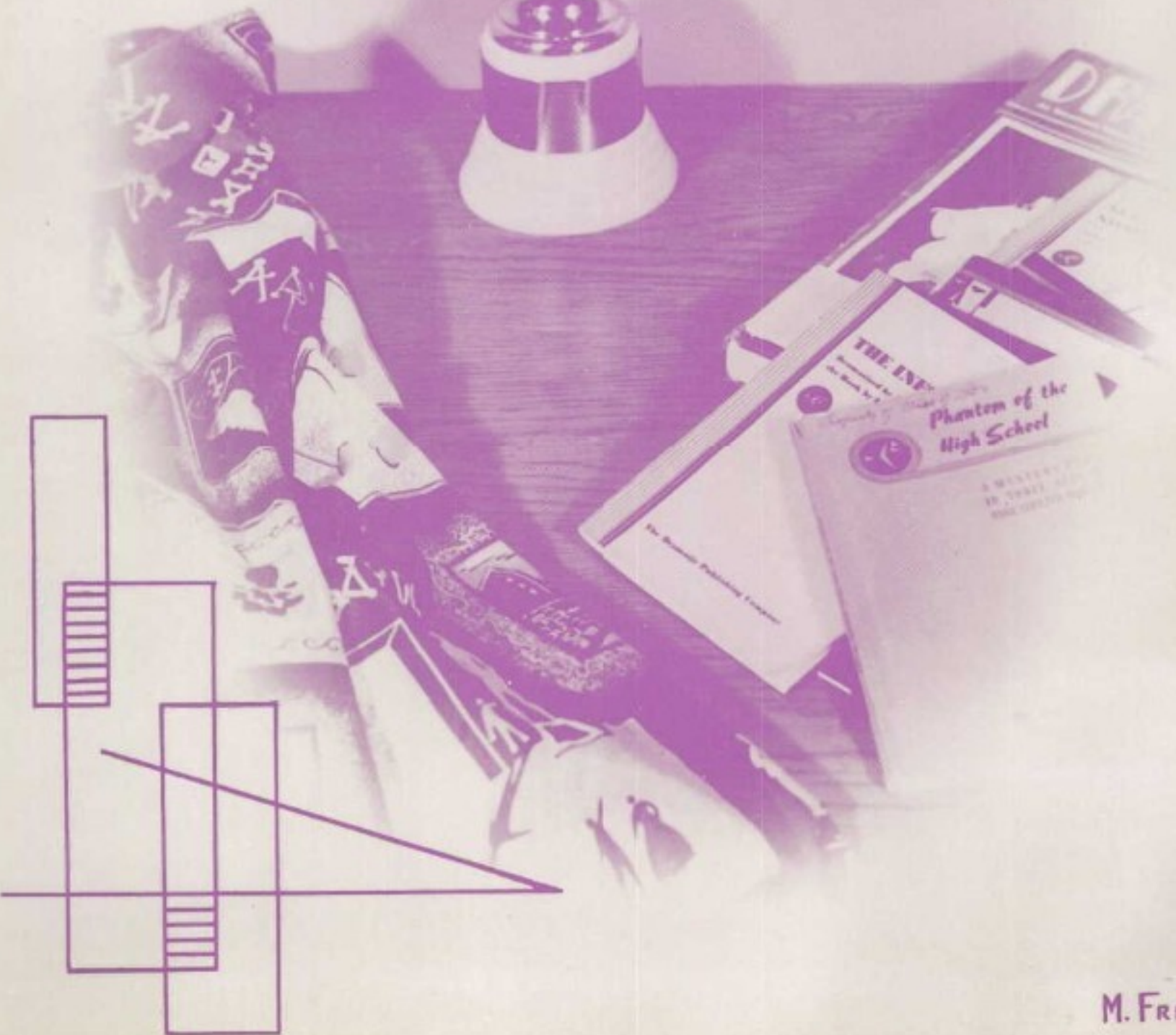

CLASS PLAYS

JUNIOR CLASS PLAY

On February 18, transforming the stage of J. H. S. into a courtroom in Illinois, the Class of '57 presented "The People Versus Maxine Lowe." Did Maxine Lowe really murder her husband? This was the question that puzzled both the audience and the jury which was subpoenaed especially for this trial. Marjorie Hanson, portraying Maxine Lowe, completely baffled her defense lawyer, James Hathaway, played by Bradley Long, and the state attorneys, played by James Miner and Mary Root.

Many witnesses including Beverly Swenson, Jean DeMoyere, Julian Elias, Suzanne McVay, who gave a delightful performance as Minnie, the Swedish scrubwoman, Louise Foti, as the bitter night club entertainer, and

Zane Peterson as the hotel owner, came to the stand to establish the character of the defendant as well as to offer facts about the murder or the defendant.

As a result of these questionings it was established that the assistant prosecuting attorney was actually Maxine Lowe's daughter, whom she had not seen for over twenty years and that the hotel owner, Vincent Barclay, was the murderer of Daniel Lowe. Mr. Barclay was seeking revenge because Daniel Lowe had been responsible for the death of Barclay's son six years before. This fine cast, under the leadership of Miss Myrtle Paetznick, kept the audience on edge throughout the entire court proceedings.

SENIOR CLASS PLAY

On November 19, 1955, the curtain rose on "The Barretts of Wimpole Street," one of the finest plays ever presented in Jamestown High School. Nancy Hernan gave a moving performance in the role of Miss Elizabeth Barrett. Equally commendable performances were given by Russell Batt, who played Elizabeth's father, Timothy Ahlstrom as the dashing Robert Browning, and Barbara Hughes and Anne R. Johnson as Elizabeth's sisters, Henrietta and Arabel.

Soon after the commencement of the play, one became aware of the domination of Edward Barrett over his household and family. He was especially "protective" of his children when it came to matters of love. He

violently opposed any romances in his family and was especially against Elizabeth's romance with the poet Robert Browning.

When Browning came into Elizabeth's life, and she fell in love with him, her attitude toward life changed from morbid solemnity, which her father demanded, to a re-awakening and a renewing of interest in the things around her. Knowing that her father would never consent to her marriage, she and Browning were married secretly and Elizabeth left the house on Wimpole Street forever.

The play was under the capable direction of Miss Myrtle Paetznick and Lillian Vitanza, student director.

"STALAG 17"

"Timber! Timber!" was the cry on January 21, 1956, as the National Forensic League of J.H.S. presented "Stalag 17".

The all-male cast was under the direction of Mr. Robert C. Wilson, debate coach of Jamestown High School. Because of previous memorable performances of all-male casts, the group realized that it faced tremendous odds in attempting to live up to the reputation established by such groups. The performance, however, left no doubt in the minds of the audience that the men of J.H.S. had done it again.

The comedy is the story of thirteen American prisoners of war in a German prison camp of World War II. In the play, a group of men is quartered in a barracks called "Stalag 17". Because their plans of escape are always being foiled, they appoint a security officer to try to catch the spy. In the end, Sefton (Russell Batt) discovers that Price, the security officer, (Timothy Ahlstrom) is the spy. Price is thrown out of the

barracks by the enraged men and is shot down by the guards.

The play had many hilarious moments. The men received gifts of hockey sticks and golf balls from their parents, who had been fooled by German propoganda into believing that the prisoners were treated as if they were in a country club. Herb (George Moyer) took a bath on stage. Myron Peck, Carl Peterson, and Hager Watson played the parts of the guards who were always trading with the prisoners and giving them such privileges as a record player and a radio.

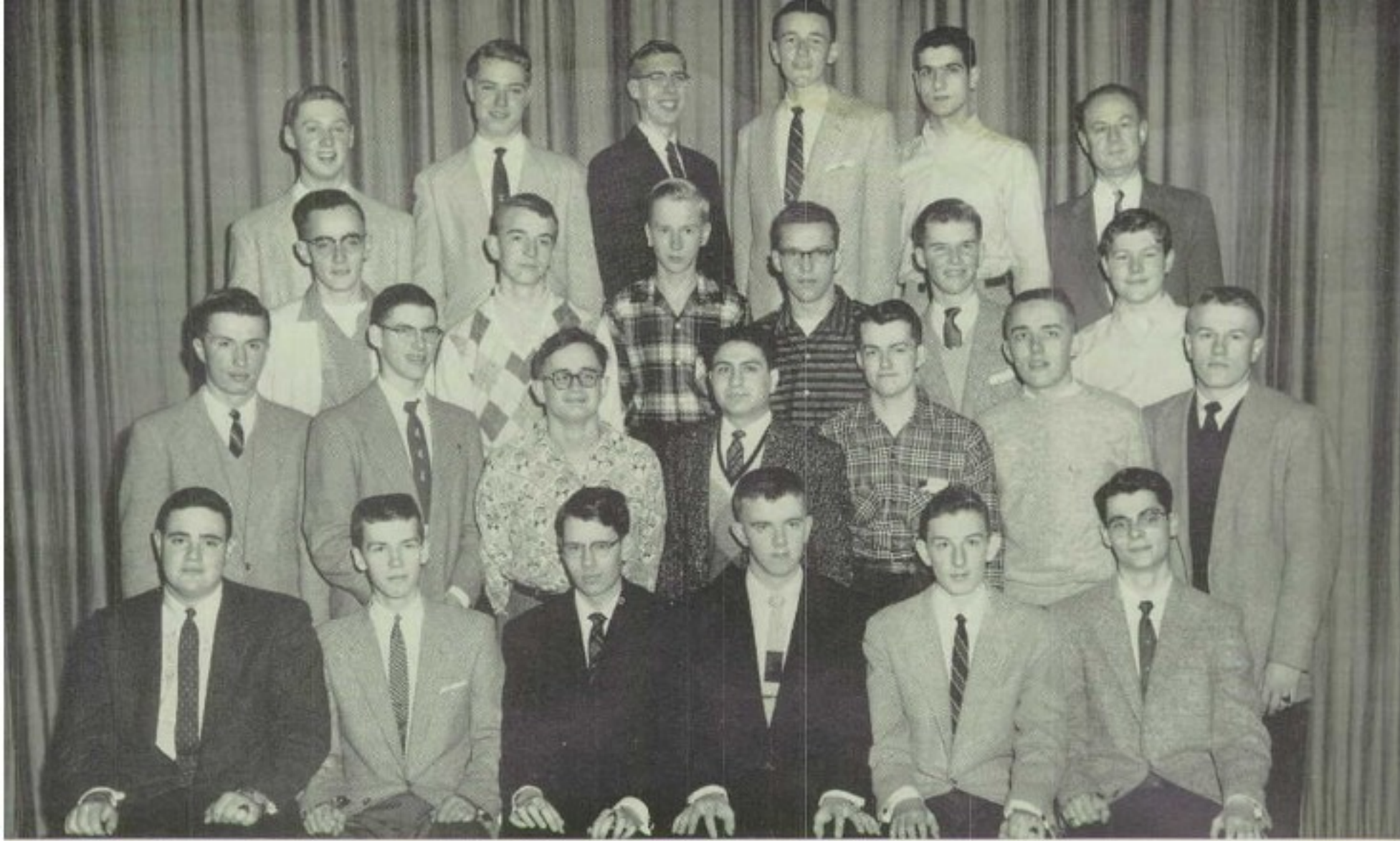

VARSITY DEBATE

"Every year almost one hundred thousand high school graduates who qualify for further training fail to go to college because they cannot afford it. Our federal government should subsidize these students with a program of scholarships."

"On the contrary, if students would only look into such possibilities as unused scholarships, student loans, corporation gifts and student employment, a policy of this type would not be needed."

These arguments were heard often during this year's busy debate schedule. The actual topic was as follows: Resolved: that Governmental Subsidies Should Be Granted According to Need to High School Graduates Who Qualify for Additional Training.

Last October, J.H.S. debaters traveled to Jeffersonville, N. Y., for their first tournament of the year. Both the experienced and semi-experienced debaters, otherwise known as teams "A" and "B", were represented. The "A" team won third place in this meet. The next trip was to Cortland for the State Teachers' College Tournament early in November where both of our divisions captured a first place. 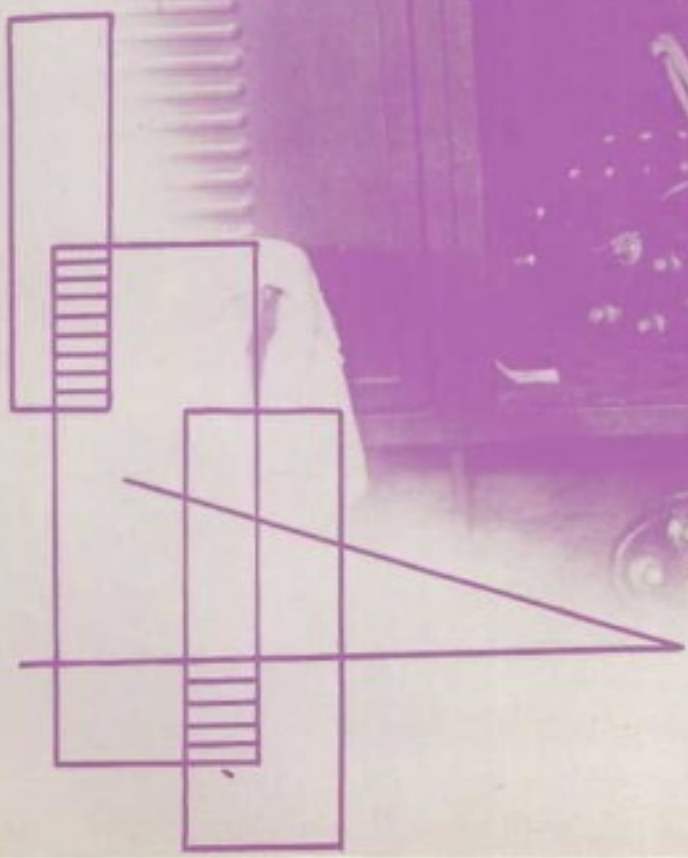

FOOTBALL

The Red Raiders' first game was with a powerful Erie Prep machine. Playing on a muddy, rain-drenched field, they were able to hold the Erie eleven throughout most of the game, but Erie's size and experience proved too great and the Raiders came out on the bottom of a 26—12 tally.

The following week, the team bounced back to top Trott Vocational of Niagara Falls by a 11—6 score. In their next game at Dunkirk, Coach Colburn's charges showed their great speed and deceptive ability as they trounced the Maroons 26—7.

With left tackle Paul Mole out of action, the Raiders played their first home game against North Tonawanda under somewhat of a weight handicap. J.H.S. suffered a 19—0 defeat which brought their season's record to two wins and two losses.

Olean's Huskies came to town having lost only one game and tied another. Once again injuries played an important role. Both Paul Mole and Wyman Ansley, the right tackle, were benched for this game, leaving the Raiders with a light forward line. They bowed to the Huskies by a 13—6 score.

The Kenmore game proved to be the most thrilling of the season. Spearheaded by Bill Bourque's fine passing and Jim DiSantis' hard running, the Raiders led 21—19 going into the final two minutes. Fate, however, dealt a hand when Kenmore recovered a fumble deep in J.H.S. territory and went on to win, 25—21.

Returning home for the next game the Raiders smashed LaSalle of Niagara Falls by a 26—6 score.

The last game was with our old rivals from Warren. Warren's Dragons proved to be too much for the Raiders in the high-spirited game as they closed out an undefeated season with a 27—2 victory.

The season ended on a successful note, however, as Jamestown's Paul Mole was named to the all state eleven.

BASKETBALL

According to Coach Rolland Taft, the J.H.S. basketball season may not have been the most sensational in the record books, but it was remarkable for the fine spirit displayed by the team. Coach Taft explained that lack of experience was a handicap, but that the will to win was always a force to reckon with. An excellent example of this spirit was the Raiders' ability to bounce back after losing four games consecutively.

Despite the mediocre record of 10 wins and 7 losses in regular season play, the Raiders held the fans in suspense until the very last minute of play. The basketball team lost and won games by the margin of one or two points. In the first game of the season the Raiders were victorious

over the Warren team by one point, 68—67. Later on in the season, Jamestown Raiders staged a second half comeback against their rival, Falconer, by another one-point margin, 62—61. In the first half of the Falconer game, J.H.S. was behind 18 points.

Next year the Raiders will have a promising ball club. Clarence "Bobo" Hunter, Wyman Ansley, and Sam Battaglia of this year's squad will be a great factor in next year's basketball season.

Under the able guidance of the sophomore coach, Allen F. Ayers, the Baby Raiders came through a successful season with a remarkable performance of 12 wins and 3 losses.

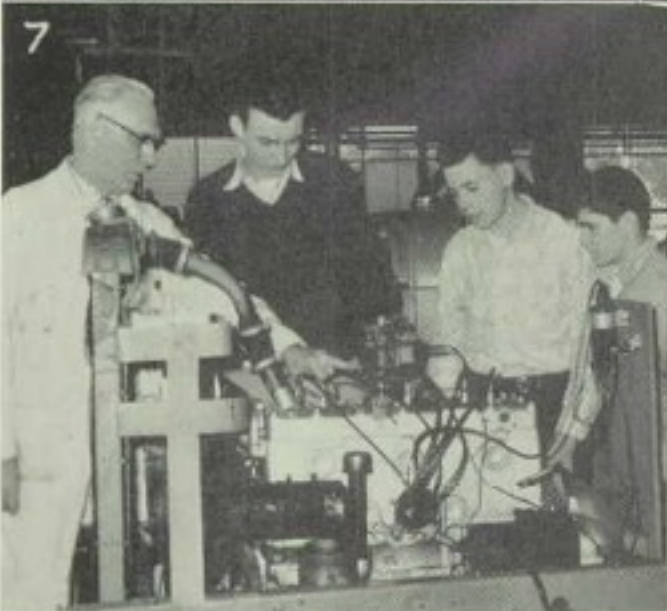
room 208 as champions of the junior class, and room 163 represented the seniors. Room 163 became the school champions when they topped the junior homeroom 22-19.
